

INTRODUCTION: CAPTURING THE MAGIC OF THE COAST

1. PRACTICAL GEAR AND ACCESSORIES

Before heading to the coast, equip yourself with the right tools to protect your gear and elevate your shots:

- ◆◆ **Filters:** Circular polarizing (CPL) and neutral density (ND) filters are essential for reducing glare and balancing exposure in bright, reflective environments.
- ◆◆ **Protective Gear:** Invest in weather-resistant bags, microfiber cloths and a blower to remove sand and water droplets from your camera.
- ◆◆ **Tripod:** Choose a sturdy tripod with adjustable legs to handle uneven terrain and strong winds.



2. EMBRACE THE ELEMENTS

Coastal environments are unpredictable, but understanding and adapting to these natural forces is the key to stunning imagery:

- ◆◆ Monitor tides and weather forecasts before heading out. Apps like Tide Charts and MyRadar can help you plan.
- ◆◆ Look for dynamic elements—waves crashing against rocks, stormy skies, or shifting light—that can add drama to your compositions.
- ◆◆ Work with, not against, the environment. Use wind to your advantage by capturing dramatic movements in water or clouds.



3. TACKLING WIND: STABILITY IS KEY

Wind can create both challenges and opportunities for coastal photographers. Here's how to keep your shots sharp:

- ◆ Use a sturdy tripod and weigh it down with your bag to prevent camera movement.
- ◆ Consider shooting from sheltered locations or positioning yourself to block the wind.

4. MASTERING THE WATER

Water is one of the most captivating elements of coastal photography. Make the most of it:

- ◆ **Crashing Waves and Mist:** Use fast shutter speeds (1/500 or faster) to freeze the motion of waves, or slower speeds for a silky water effect.
- ◆ **Weatherproof Gear:** Protect your camera with a waterproof cover and use a lens with a weather-sealed body.
- ◆ **Cleaning Salt Residue:** After shooting, use a microfiber cloth dampened with fresh water to clean lenses and gear.
- ◆ **Managing Glare:** CPL filters are your best friend for reducing reflections on water and wet rocks.

5. WORKING WITH THE SUN

The sun is both a challenge and a gift in coastal photography. Learn how to work with its light:



Golden Hours:

Sunrise and sunset offer warm, soft light that enhances coastal textures and colors. Adjust your white balance to emphasize golden tones.



Midday Light:

Midday sun creates harsh shadows and bright highlights. Use these creatively for dramatic high-contrast images or find ways to diffuse the light.




Direct Sunlight:

Use a CPL filter to enhance skies and reduce glare. For "God Rays," scout locations with obstructions like trees or rocks to filter sunlight.



Dynamic Range:

Capture the full tonal range of sunrise and sunset with bracketing, then combine exposures in post-processing for stunning results.



6. THE CHALLENGES OF WORKING IN SAND

Sand is unavoidable at the coast, but it doesn't have to ruin your shoot:

- ◆◆ **Stabilizing Your Tripod:** Use a wide base or tripod spikes to prevent your gear from sinking into soft sand.
- ◆◆ **Cleaning Your Gear:** After shooting, carefully remove sand from joints and crevices with a small brush or compressed air.

7. SETTINGS FOR WATER MOTION

The movement of water adds an element of magic to coastal images. Use these settings to create your desired effect:

- ◆◆ **Freezing Motion:**
 - Shutter speed: 1/500 or higher.
 - Adjust ISO and aperture as needed for proper exposure.
- ◆◆ **Smoothing Motion:**
 - ISO: 100 or lower.
 - Aperture: f/8–f/16 for depth of field.
 - Shutter speed: 2 seconds or longer for silky effects.

8. THE ALLURE OF LIGHTHOUSES

Lighthouses are iconic coastal subjects, blending architectural beauty with the ruggedness of nature. Here's how to capture them at their best:

- ◆◆ **Golden Hour:** Photograph lighthouses during sunrise or sunset to highlight their structure against dramatic skies.
- ◆◆ **Foreground Interest:** Incorporate elements like wildflowers, rocks, or waves in the foreground to add depth and context.
- ◆◆ **Night Photography:** Many lighthouses come alive at night with their glowing beacons. Use long exposures to capture the beam of light as it sweeps across the horizon.
- ◆◆ **Perspective:** Experiment with angles. Shoot from below to emphasize their towering presence, or from a distance to show them as part of the larger landscape.
- ◆◆ **Weather:** Stormy conditions can add mood and drama to lighthouse shots. Be sure to protect your gear while shooting in inclement weather.



9. POST-SHOOT CLEANING

Saltwater, mist and sand can wreak havoc on your gear if not addressed promptly:

- ◆ Rinse your tripod and accessories with fresh water after every coastal shoot.
- ◆ Wipe down your camera and lenses with a microfiber cloth dampened with fresh water.
- ◆ Store your gear in a weather-resistant bag to prevent corrosion.

10. PRACTICE AND PATIENCE

Coastal photography rewards those willing to wait for the perfect moment:

- ◆ Observe your surroundings and wait for the right combination of light, waves and weather.
- ◆ Experiment with compositions, angles and settings to find your unique perspective.
- ◆ Be prepared to revisit the same location multiple times to capture its full beauty.

By working with the elements instead of against them and mastering key techniques like managing light, water and movement, you can elevate your work and create photos that truly stand out.
